



In April 2018 Mary's Mercy Center through its Mary's Table and Mary's Children provided the following services;

Meals served: 5,971 (includes lunches for parolees)

Food Bags: 466 bags over 3 Wednesdays
Showers (including a change of clothes): 409
Hygiene kits: 383 plus 148 shaving kits

Clothing (2-4 outfits and shoes): 120 of which 89 were for extreme emergencies. 62 pairs of shoes. We

were able to give 23 blankets, 36 jackets

Children's Program: 27 families' needs were met. We were also able to help these families with two

strollers, two car seat and over 80 pounds of clothes
